

Parish Council update

We try to be as environmentally friendly as possible in our household, using water economically, recycling wherever possible and taking our own shopping bags to the supermarket. I was rather surprised and not a little confused to hear that Morrisons was phasing out its 'bags for life' as it seems most people were treating them as 'bags for a week' and not reusing them at all.

It's to introduce a 30p paper version instead which sounds great until it was pointed out that paper bags take four times as much energy to produce as plastic ones.

I thought rather smugly that as we had cotton shopping bags we could consider ourselves somewhat superior in our planet saving efforts. Now I've discovered we have to use them 131 times to make them equal to single use bags due to the high energy levels required in the production of cotton. And if you actually wash the bags to counter accidental spillages you'll just give yourself more sleepless nights! So, if you see me in Morrisons balancing fruit on my head and with my arms full of vegetables you'll know why!

I'd also like to take this opportunity to thank Robin Maynard who, each week for the past 3 years, has checked that the defibrillator is in working order and sends off a monthly report to South Western Ambulance Service. Such dedication is much appreciated by us all.

Finally, by the time you read this, the result of the Bickleigh Sunflower competition will have been announced. Most homes in the village were given a few sunflower seeds at the start of lockdown to do with as they wished. At the time of writing a number of photo entries have been received and already it's clear that the judge from the gardening club will have a tricky job in deciding on a winner. I'm told it's not just about the height – the colour, shape and size of the head all play a part.

Letter from the Rector

As a young teenager growing up in Tiverton, the school summer holidays meant Freedom. Freedom to enjoy the summer days as we wished. It was during those long summer days that I first fell in love with the landscape of this beautiful part of the world. I would take off on my Raleigh bicycle with three Sturmey Archer hub gears, that seemed quite adequate for any hill, and head up the Exe Valley, through Dulverton and up on to the moors. Ah, the energy of one's youth!

Although I had known this landscape all my life, it was only when I had the freedom to explore it close at hand on bike and foot that I felt I got to know it well - and fall in love with it. Those long summers, without the distraction of school work and exams, the chance to explore and just soak up the beauty all around provided what you might even call a Sabbath time for me.

When we hear the word Sabbath, our thoughts are probably of a 'traditional' Sunday, where obedience to the fourth commandment - 'Remember that thou keep holy the Sabbath day' - was strictly observed.

Such a weekly Sabbath has now all but disappeared. However that does not negate the need for 'Sabbath' and the reason that such times were ordained by God. In its truest sense a Sabbath time is not about putting our feet up or mowing the lawn or keeping various 'thou shalt not on the Lord's Day' rules. It is a glimpse of a different view of time.

We can fool ourselves into believing that time is all about progress – always moving forward towards the 'sun lit uplands' of our dreams. We will create better homes, better food, better things to enjoy, better medicines- a better world. There are setbacks (we don't need to be reminded of that this year!), but if we all push hard together, one great heave, and we will arrive in the 'promised land'.

'Sabbath' takes us out of that sort of thinking about time and gives us a glimpse of eternity – a glimpse of heaven. In the Bible, the writer of the Letter to the Hebrews tells us 'a Sabbath rest still remains for the people of God; for those who enter God's rest also cease from their labours as God did from his.'

So what is the essence of Sabbath? A Polish American rabbi called Abraham Joshua Heschel seemed to capture it well when he wrote 'the meaning of the Sabbath is to celebrate time rather than space. Six days a week we live under the tyranny of things of space; on the Sabbath we try to become attuned to holiness in time. It is a day on which we are called upon to share in what is eternal in time, to turn from the results of creation to the mystery of creation; from the world of creation to the creation of the world'

[Sabbath] 'is a realm of time where the goal is not to have but to be, not to own but to give, not to control but to share, not to subdue but to be in accord. Life goes wrong when the control of space, the acquisition of things of space, becomes our sole concern.'

As we have been and are still experiencing a period when work, leisure, time and space have all been thrown out of kilter, the need to find Sabbath rest is all the more important.

As I found some Sabbath time on those longago summers' days, I pray you and I may also find some blessed Sabbath rest again.
