A LETTER FROM OUR RECTOR

THE REVEREND ALAN MACDONALD

Dear friends,

A fond farewell

Way back in May 1995, at a Deanery Visitation in Aylesbeare Deanery, I asked the Archdeacon of Exeter whether my application to move from St John in the Wilderness, Exmouth to Exminster might be successful. He told me to forget it because the vacancy had been filled. So I asked were there any other parishes I might consider. He replied that there was the United Benefice of Silverton, Butterleigh, Bickleigh & Cadeleigh but he did not think that was right for me! He would, however, include me in the list of those to be interviewed, if I so wished. The rest is history.

I never found out why the Archdeacon had his reservations but they did not stop him supporting my appointment. I have spent the past 23 years discovering the joys and privileges of working in this lovely part of Mid Devon. Not once have I regretted coming. Not once have I thought of seeking fresh pastures.

As I approach my retirement in January I have mixed emotions. To go is the right thing: the parishes will profit from a fresh pair of eyes and new ideas that only a new incumbent can bring. But I feel sad about giving up the most rewarding of jobs which I have shared with a large group of able and supportive people.

I came to teach and have tried to do so, but I have learned much more. Through colleagues and through people trusting me with their deepest thoughts I have gained insights and understanding that no training course or book could provide. I thank all concerned.

I have been very well supported by four Church Councils and a good number of folk filling important roles, without whom our churches would have failed to function.

I will undoubtedly have disappointed and upset some people. I hope the number is small. To them I offer my sincere apologies.

Saying farewell is rarely easy and I know I am going to miss my active role as Rector. But I look forward to living in the village as a man of some leisure and to planning ways of helping the wider church in my retirement.

I will not be able to take services in the four villages until at least twelve months after my successor is appointed: that is the policy of the Diocese. That also means that I will have to worship elsewhere and to begin with I will attend the Cathedral. I am expected to keep a low profile to make way for my successor.

Christmas Services - In a major change from past decades the traditional service of Readings and Carols takes place at St Mary's Church on Sunday 23rd December at 6.30 pm not on Christmas Eve. The service on Christmas Day is one of Holy Communion starting at 11 am.

Remembrance - The focus for this centenary year since the cessation of hostilities from the First World War has been "Lest we forget". Year 5 from Bickleigh School led the school's own service of Remembrance then, later in the week, joined villagers in the Village Hall where the names of the parish fallen were read out. We were joined by Mrs Penny Roe of Cadeleigh who read a poem written by her father a Second World War veteran and handled some of Penny's and other's memorabilia from both world wars. The Parish service on the 11th raised some £200 for the work of the Royal British Legion. The school has also involved the pupils in raising funds and awareness for Children in Need and World Diabetes Day topping off November with a successful School Association Christmas Fayre.

Our Rector - I recall quite clearly the day in 1995 when our Rector, the Rev Alan MacDonald, visited our parish church quietly and on his own. I happened

to meet him as he left walking down the hill. We introduced ourselves. Alan in passing said to me that in the silence of the church's interior he had felt a strong spiritual sense of peace. Alan has been our tireless shepherd and teacher since that date. Now he is retiring. As Christians we look to the future in faith; belief and trust in God. That is our teaching. Many who come into St Mary's privily, remark in the Visitors' Book that sense of peace and of beauty. I refer to a building which has served the parishioners of Bickleigh for some seven hundred years. Outside the bounds of the church lies our parish graveyard. Not as old but tended with care as "God's Acre" a home to nature as it is to our dead, beloved family members. They are never forgotten.

To Alan, his wife Eileen and their family we pray for a peaceful transition. Very many of us are indebted to Alan in ways no other person will know. I offer these few, inadequate words, to a man of God. This I know in mind and heart.



BICKLEIGH DRAMA NIGHTS

The Tantalising smells of the delicious Thai and Ceylon Curry suppers pervaded the walls of Bickleigh Village Hall as the Bickleigh Drama Group put on two evenings of a tasty meal followed by a Comedy Play. This is the fifth year that this small friendship group have taken to the stage to provide wholesome entertainment in aid of the Devon Air Ambulance Trust.

The play, entitled "The Sharp End", by Geoff Bamber and licenced by Lazy Bee Scripts, is set at Hillcrest Manor where the Estate is to host a lavish trade function. Lady Elvira Hillcrest, (Rose Chanin), is not convinced that this is a good idea despite the efforts of event manager Matthew Sharp (Mark Radford) and his assistant Elaine Jenner (Helen May). Unfortunately Lady Hillcrest has other things on her mind, principally her son and heir Tarquin (Richard Chanin). He seems unable to acquire a bride with a view to carrying on the family line, so the flamboyant French personal stylist, Juste Valadier (Dave Fuller) is called in to turn Targuin into a more attractive proposition. Also in attendance is a dour Eastern European hitman (Richard Somerwill) seeking out an as yet unnamed victim and clearly willing to eliminate anyone who gets in his way. The Housekeeper (Siobhan Gilroy) and the mysterious Luda (Lynette Parkhouse) clearly have their own secrets which all add to the intrigue of a very cleverly written storyline. Add to the mix the homeless Finneran family (Jackie Mitchell, Neil Powell and Emily Vallis) and blunt Yorkshire businessman, Norman Arbuthnot (Paul Little), with whom the Hillcrests have 'history', and the words of Matthew Sharp's mantra - 'A successful Event is an Uneventful Event'- seem to fall on stony ground. Production of the performances was by Rose Chanin and the Technician was Adam Jones.

The play was performed for the evenings of 27th and 28th October and the responsive audiences indicated, without question, that the characterisation by all cast members enabled a complex tale to be delivered in a very approachable and easily-followed storyline.

Such was the enjoyment of the audience that their very generous donations to the charity enabled the cast to present a cheque to representatives of the Devon Air Ambulance Trust for the staggering amount of $\pounds1,634.77$.


