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HEDGEROWS AND THEIR NATURAL HISTORY

I was pleased to receive a very informative book for Christmas on the Natural History of the Hedgerow. Even I with a basic knowledge of hedgerows would be pleased to identify a few dozen species of plants and animals. Would you agree with this estimate? Perhaps you may think this to be about right, or maybe more. I was surprised to find that my estimate was way out. In 2015 a Dr Rob Wolton found that an average Devon hedge (probably considerably above average compared to most hedges in Britain) contained 2,070 species of plant, animal, lichen and fungus. This excludes microscopic organisms. Many of these organisms are still awaiting identification and he thinks at least 3,000 different species may be nearer the mark.

I don't know about you but I found this absolutely remarkable and should give pause to anyone inclined to destroy a hedge. The biodiversity then of hedgerows is of considerable importance whereas most of the surrounding land tends to be a biological desert (mainly due to intensive farming practices). Of further interest from the book is that it is estimated that area wise the total hedgerow content of Britain would fit into Devon about five times. It is clear that we need to really value our hedges and improve protection and maintence as a priority. Is it too much to hope that our Government will incorporate this into the the Agriculture Bill, currently going through Parliament? Don't hold your breath!



Another interesting article was about estimating the age of a hedge by the number of woody species in a 30 metre length of hedge. Dr Hooper formulated a rule that 10 species in such a length indicates it is 1000 years old plus. Hooper's Rule is a rough and ready indicator of ancient hedges. Try this rule around some of our hedges and it may well confirm the ancient lineage of some of our lanes around the parish. The Village history group made reference to an interesting publication by Dr Duncan Probert a couple of years ago and the hedgerow rule appears to tie in nicely with his hypothesis on the very ancient origin of routes in and out of Bickleigh.

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BICKLEIGH WEATHER WATCH

We are lucky to live in a special part of the world, not only for the dramatic scenery of the Exe Valley, which is hard to beat as I drive down the A396 on a misty morning, but also because we have a designated world heritage site just down the road: the Jurassic Coast.

The weather on the Earth has varied greatly since the Jurassic. Very long term shifts in the climate are caused by astronomical cycles, volcanism and even the action of living organisms which changed the constituents of the air. In the carboniferous for example, there was so much oxygen in the air that it allowed gigantism in insects and so fossils of dragonflies as large as dustbin lids have been found in rocks of this age!

Even the continents changed shape on these timescales. Over many millions of years, continental drift changed the world map thorough unrecognisable patterns. During the Triassic period between 200 and 250 million years ago, the enormous supercontinent of Pangea was the dominant land mass and like all great continents, it had an intense desert climate away from the coastlines. However, the inexorable creep of continental drift eventually split Pangea

apart and in the subsequent Jurassic period when the rocks of our local coastline were first laid down, the deserts gave way to vast areas of humid rainforests. These were populated by dinosaurs, the first birds and even our early mammal ancestors.

The oceans were also teeming with life at this time and my son and I have been lucky enough to find dramatic evidence of this ourselves on the coast near Charmouth where we recently uncovered and extracted proof of the terrible beasts that were swimming in the Jurassic ocean. I hope the black and white print in the Bugle does justice to our newly discovered Ichthyosaur!

The Jurassic period was first named by Alexander Von Humboldt, a true polymath who contributed to many areas of science, including meteorology. In his memoirs he even seems to have foreseen the advent of long range weather forecasting through his awareness of the much higher predictability of the weather in the tropics. I imagine he would have been equally interested in the current state of the science, which suggests that we are likely to be in a severe cold snap by the time you read this article.....

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
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BICKLEIGH VILLAGE HALL NEWS
